


Bring your own picnic lunch for food & fellowship on the church grounds following worship!



Letter from the Pastor:

Dear Friends,

This week was another week of news filled with stories of shootings, juries, verdicts, pain, uncertainty, and loss, or anticipated loss. There was also, in some states, a rise in the numbers of COVID cases. Yet, there is still hope. More and more of those who are eligible to do so are getting one of the available vaccines. We certainly need to respect the fact that some, because of health concerns, will be unable to (or choose not to) receive one of the vaccines. But for others, let's embrace the opportunity to build up the touted herd immunity that will allow things to normalize that much faster. I am pleased to say that each of the ministers and administrative staff have received both their shots.

In spite of my hope, my heart has been a bit heavy this week thinking about all the things going on in our world right now. I received a reminder, though, of Jesus' words, "In this world you will have trouble... but take heart! I have overcome the world."

You've certainly heard me reference our seeing light at the end of the tunnel. In talking about the pandemic, Pope Frances said, "The basic rule of a crisis is that you don't come out of it the same. If you get through it, you come out better or worse, but never the same." Our faith in Christ requires/compels us not to throw up our hands and give up, but to roll up our sleeves, embrace the better, and get to work embodying love and acting as instruments of healing and hope. Let us look for, and embrace, opportunities to do just that.

My friend George Mason recently told a story about Maya Angelou whose birthday was April 4. Maya was active in the civil rights movement. On her birthday in 1968, Martin Luther King, Jr. was assassinated, and she fell into a state of depression. Maya was encouraged by friends to tell her story in the form of an autobiography, but she repeatedly refused.

James Baldwin knew her spirit. He suggested a different tactic to a Random House editor. The editor called one last time and told Maya that it was just as well she refused because it's too difficult to write an autobiography that is also good literature. Challenge accepted. The result was the acclaimed *I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings*.

Maya Angelou always kept the slave narrative in her mind, as it played itself out through her body, too. The legacy of slavery and white supremacy continues to haunt Black Americans, as they feel themselves assigned to the lowest place in the social hierarchy.

But Angelou also had her Christian faith to buoy her whenever she felt she was being pulled under the current for good. It's an Easter faith rooted in deliverance from the dead. Jesus' resurrection was fore-shadowed in the deliverance from slavery of the children of Israel through the deadly waters of the Sea.

It wasn't an Easter poem per se, as she wrote 'Still I Rise' ... (for a presidential inauguration). But the theme of rising is most definitely an Easter truth. The first and last stanzas remind us that Christ's resurrection power, and the hope it brings, is still loose in the world.



You may write me down in history With your bitter, twisted lies, You may trod me in the very dirt But still, like dust, I'll rise... Leaving behind nights of terror and fear I rise Into a daybreak that's wondrously clear I rise Bringing the gifts that my ancestors gave, I am the dream and the hope of the slave. I rise I rise I rise.

Friends, on your darkest day(s), may you rise with resurrection hope.
